LMIC Workshop 1 Doing knowledge exchange during the COVID 19 pandemic – what lessons have we learnt?

## Background

The pandemic has forced researchers to adapt the ways that they engage with partners in the Global South. Equally, communities, civil society and governments have had to find new ways to work in partnership with academics. The move towards online and digital platforms has presented challenges, however it has also led to innovative approaches to promote the active participation of all stakeholders. This workshop will provide an opportunity for researchers and research partners to share experiences and identify good practices.

### Objectives

- Discuss the implications of the COVID 19 pandemic on knowledge exchange and partnerships in LMIC
- Promote learning among researchers and non-academic partners
- Identify effective approaches and good practices

### Audience

CoSS researchers working in LMIC and non-academic research partners.

### Format

Researchers and research partners will present successful knowledge exchange approaches adopted during the pandemic. Workshop participants will be organized in a Zoom breakout rooms to share their experiences and select useful strategies to promote knowledge exchange. Each group will have a set of guiding questions for discussion and facilitator.

The discussions from the breakout rooms will be summarised in a document and submitted to workshop participants for feedback. The final version will be presented as a guide which will be shared with stakeholders working in LMIC.
