Vision of the optimist

Poverty / Narrow range of access is an inevitable (but unproblematic) social ill

Poor / uneducated people are to blame

Our anti-poverty interventions have not been sufficiently effective to tackle poverty / HEI access in Scotland

Vested interests create and maintain poverty / limited access





Education and Poverty

- Fair access to HE is a whole-system issue
- If fair access to HE is *the* goal then that only reinforces social inequality
- Education should not be allowed to be a vehicle to reinforce social inequality
- Education cannot solve poverty, but education must contribute effectively to whole-system efforts to tackle poverty
